

What to do with your Flood Related Debris

Appliances - contact a local scrapper for help they may be willing to pick up, otherwise treat as normal. Local scrappers include All Metals Recycling, Cutting Edge Auto, and Croteau Auto Body.

Construction & Demolition Waste - damaged building materials, as well as household items such as furnishings, clothing etc. with visible storm related damage. This is the waste that our contractors will collect. Please place in piles directly beside the road for pick up.

E-Waste - handle as normal. Bring to a Vermont E-Waste Recycling Facility for free disposal. <https://anrweb.vt.gov/DEC/EWaste/facilitylist.aspx>

Household Trash - It remains the resident's sole responsibility to dispose of their household trash. It is quite easy to identify if items left out are storm related or normal household trash. All piles will be inspected, documented, and if found to be household trash or debris not damaged by the flood they will be left at the side of the road for the homeowner to handle.

Household Hazardous Waste - Please bring storm related HHW to the Barton Town Clerk's Office for collection. You may also bring it to one of the two annual HHW days each year.

Silt / Muck - It is the responsibility of the homeowner to dispose of silt and/or muck.

Vegetative Debris - It is the responsibility of the homeowner to bring all vegetative debris to the stump dump in Orleans for disposal.

Timing - All debris must be placed roadside before Tuesday, August 8th, to be included in the single pass debris removal program. Any debris not left out for that time will become the responsibility of the homeowner to dispose of separately. Debris will be picked up between Tuesday, 8/8 and Friday, 8/11.

Placement of Debris - Please place debris immediately beside the road. This may mean placing your debris in a ditch. Please stay at least 4' away from any obstruction (mailbox, tree, phone pole, hydrant, etc.) to allow the mechanical arm to access it easily.

Standard of Cleanup - The debris removal teams will consider a site cleaned when the debris remaining contains no pieces larger than a fist, and all the remaining pieces would fit into a black trash bag. Those remnants are the homeowner's responsibility to then dispose of.
